Weekly Maths activities	Reading and Writing
<p><b>Measuring and comparing Length</b>  <b>Comparing mass</b></p> <p>Visit the White Rose website  <a href="https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-2/">https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-2/</a>      Click on 'Summer Term - Week 10'. There are four short videos for you to watch.</p> <p>Four worksheets and a sheet with the video links have been uploaded onto Purple Mash.</p> <p>The Lessons are as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Lesson 1: Measuring mass in grams</li> <li>Lesson 2: Measuring mass in kilograms</li> <li>Lesson 3: Comparing volume</li> <li>Lesson 4: Measuring using millilitres</li> </ul> <p><b>Challenge – With a grown up</b></p> <p>Find a range of fairly small containers in your house which usually contain liquids. You could have a look in your recycling bin.      Estimate how many ml of water the containers could hold.      Use a measuring jug from the kitchen to work out how close your estimates were.</p> <p>Stand on some weighing scales and find out your weight in kg and g. Now estimate and measure the weight of everyone in your house. You might want to include your pets – as long as they don't mind being weighed.</p>  <p><b>Multiplication</b>      On Purple Mash complete the multiplication 2Do for the 2, 5 and 10 times tables.</p>	<p><b>Reading</b>  <a href="https://sooperbooks.com/story/mad-hair-day/">https://sooperbooks.com/story/mad-hair-day/</a></p> <p>Ask an adult to read through the story first. As an adult reads, listen out for the rhymes. As a grown up reads the story, discuss the meaning of the following words:</p> <p>promptly      expose      highland      fiery      proclaim</p> <p>Read the poem aloud to an adult. As you read, try to put expression into your voice.</p> <p>Read some of Joshua Seigal's poems:  <a href="https://www.joshuaseigal.co.uk/my-poems">https://www.joshuaseigal.co.uk/my-poems</a></p> <p>With a grown up, discuss which poem you liked the most.</p> <p><b>Poems by Michael Rosen</b></p> <p>Listen to the poem 'Air' by Michael Rosen.  <a href="https://childrens.poetryarchive.org/poem/air/">https://childrens.poetryarchive.org/poem/air/</a></p> <p>You will need to listen to the poem a few times. On a piece of paper jot down all the things that are mentioned in the poem e.g. a balloon, a swing and air in my hair.</p> <p>Fold a plain piece of paper into four sections. Each section is a quarter. In each quarter draw an illustration for the poem. Add as much detail as you can. Colour in your pictures with coloured pencils. When we have a video chat during the week starting the 13<sup>th</sup> July, we can show our illustrations.</p>

Can you find objects in your home which have –ey at the end of the word?  Learn these words using the look say cover write check approach: key, money, honey, monkey, donkey, turkey and valley  <b>Challenge:</b> How many phonemes in <i>chimney</i>?  Complete the phonics cloze activity for ey and au on Purple Mash.</p> <p><b>Wizards and Dragons</b>  Revise these Year 2 common exception words: whole, any, clothes, busy, people, water, again, half and money.  On Purple Mash, complete the quiz for summer 2 week 5. This has been set as a 2do.</p> <p>If you have access to a printer, there is also a look say cover write check sheet that you can use.  Ask an adult to do the dictation for summer 2 week 5 with you. The adult reads out the sentences and you write down the words that should go in the empty spaces. The adult will tell you what the missing word is and you just have to spell it correctly. This is a very good way to practise your spellings.</p> <p><b>Grammar</b>  Complete the 'In the woods' 2do on Purple <b>Mash</b>.</p> <p><b>Handwriting – Log on to Sky Writer</b>  Practise your handwriting by copying out this short minibeast poem. Try to use your neatest, joined handwriting:</p> <p>Today I saw a little worm  Wriggling on his belly.  Perhaps he'd like to come inside  And see what's on the Telly.</p> <p>For additional guidance on supporting your child with their handwriting visit the handwriting association:  <a href="https://nha-handwriting.org.uk/">https://nha-handwriting.org.uk/</a></p>	<p><b>Animal Habitats</b>  Visit:  <a href="https://www.abpischools.org.uk/age-range/5-7">https://www.abpischools.org.uk/age-range/5-7</a></p> <p>Click on Animal Habitats.  Play the Habitats Game – this is great fun and teaches you as you complete the quiz. Play this game as often as you like.</p> <p>On Purple Mash there are two 2dos to complete:</p> <p>Animal Habitats – muddled sentences  Animal Habitats – Anagrams</p> <p>Once you have downloaded the sheet, write your answers on the sheet or ask an adult to help you type in the answers.  If it is easier, write the answers on a piece of paper.</p> <p><b>Art and Design/Science</b>  Ask an adult to help you to make a model of a minibeast. You can use whatever craft materials that you have available. This is a great way to recycle materials. ## Foundation Subject Activities

### Geography – Which dishes and foods do people traditionally eat in Scotland?

With a grown up, watch the PowerPoint about Scottish Food which has been uploaded onto Purple Mash.

With a grown - up have a go at making either some Scottish Oat Cakes or some Scottish shortbread. Carefully measure out the ingredients using grams and millilitres.



**Challenge:** On Purple Mash complete the 2do called ‘Create a Scottish Menu’

You have to design a menu for a Scottish day in school. Include a main course and a dessert.

If it is easier for you, write your menu onto a piece of paper or card. You can include a brief description of each dish as some of them may sound strange. You only need to complete 2- 3 pages. Include a vegetarian course if you want to.

You can decorate your menu with Scottish symbols such as the thistle, the Scottish flag or the Loch Ness monster.

## **Downloading Documents from Purple Mash – Guidance for Parents**

### **PDF Documents**

Log on to Purple Mash and click on the 2do tab.

Scroll down and find the 2do. The maths sheets are all PDFs.

Download the document.

Save the PDF into a folder on your laptop.

Minimise Purple Mash.

Open the document on Adobe reader from your laptop and on the right hand side you will see some options. Click on edit now.

Click on comment and then click on **T** on the tool bar along the top.

This will allow you to write on the PDF. With some devices you can simply download, save, open and then straight away write on the document.

When you are finished, save the document into a folder.

Go back to Purple Mash.

Click on the work tab along the top and upload the edited PDF from the folder on your laptop.

For Word documents, you follow the same steps as above but you do not need to click on edit PDF or the Comment option.

If you are struggling to download the maths PDFs, you can log onto the Oak Academy home learning site and your child can complete the maths home learning suggested on the site. There are clips linked to home learning tasks.
